City News

A Message From The Mayor



Starting in January, you will find an increase to your water and sewer bills and smaller increases in other utility bills. The increases were approved after thorough and careful consideration by your city council. The increases are helping cover deficits in operations costs of the utilities, providing for infrastructure replacements/upgrades, and are funding the replacement of necessary personnel that were eliminated during the recent economic downturn. They're necessary to continue providing minimum levels of services to our citizens.

Operations

Both the water and sewer utilities have recently undergone intense scrutiny and analysis by third party consultants to determine sustainable rate structures necessary to keep the utilities providing clean water and sanitary sewer services for our citizens. Both utilities have been operating at a deficit in the last few years, as the cost of providing the services has increased but no rate adjustments were done to compensate.

Infrastructure

In the area of infrastructure, the City has three wells. One is completely out of service and another is failing, which leaves just one well providing water to the whole city most of the time. In the sewer utility, the Department of Ecology is imposing extremely strict new requirements for water purity, at the cost of tens of millions of dollars to the City. Much of the cost of these projects will be funded through debt, but some must also be funded through increased rates.

Personnel

Finally, the City has gone from a high of 54 budgeted full-time employees in 2008-2009 to only 34 actual full-time employees in 2017. During this time the City's population has grown by almost 10%, from 8600 to 9440 residents. The City has been seriously under staffed for a number of years; we can no longer safely provide police and fire services or provide an organized plan for the City's growth. Part of the utility increases will fund replacement of two police officers, a fire training officer in the Fire Department and a community development service technician.

The City Council and I recognize the utility changes and the recent changes to garbage disposal provided by Basin Disposal are an increase in your costs; however, they are necessary if the City is going to provide a clean, safe, and welcoming place to call home. Why School Levies Are Important

Every four years the College Place School District asks voters to decide on a four-year Maintenance and Replacement Levy. This year's election is scheduled for Feb. 13, 2018 and voters are being asked to replace the levy which expires at the end of 2018.

School levies supplement the funding received from the state and federal government. Without levies, College Place Public Schools would look very different. Levies fund student learning and staffing, health and safety, technology, athletics, activities, transportation, operations and maintenance.

Voters need to be aware that sweeping changes have been made to K-12 Educational Funding. During the last legislative session, our state government enacted a law which will take effect in 2018. These changes will impact your taxes and also regulate how districts can collect and use local levy dollars. Specifically, the state increased the statewide property tax *by an average of \$0.81/\$1000 of assessed value.* * This helps pay for teacher salaries and limited basic education needs.

The state also reduced the amount of money that can be collected at local levels through school levies to \$1.50/ \$1000 of assessed value and renamed them School Programs & Operations Levy.

While the upcoming levy replaces the current levy, it now is limited to what it covers. Our District is now required to run separate levies for School Programs & Operations, Safety & Technology and Transportation.

The Good News

These items were already in the last voter approved levy and the three levies combined will reduce your taxes* beginning in 2019 when the new levy takes effect.

So remember when voting this February 13th, that the three levies;

1) School Programs & Operations, 2) Safety & Technology and 3) Transportation Vehicle Fund are included in the current local levy but are now required by the state to be listed separately on the upcoming ballot.

Levy Fast Facts

*The current 4- year levy expires December 2018

*The state reduced the amount the district can collect to \$1.50/\$1000 of assessed value

*This is NOT a new tax, it REPLACES the current Maintenance & Operations Levy

*The district is required to run separate levies for School Programs & Operations, Safety & Technology & Transportation

*This is NOT a Bond to build something

*The current levy is \$3.10/\$1000 of assessed value

City Of College Place Library Card Program



The City Council has established a Library Card Program to fund library cards for verified residents of the City of College Place. Individuals or families that qualify for this program shall be entitled to payment sent directly to either the City of Walla Walla Library, or the Walla Walla Rural Library District, for the cost of a non-resident membership after successfully filling out a city application for the library card. This program is only in effect while funds are available in the current year budget.

The 2018 Budget has \$3,000 set aside for payment of library cards. Applications will be accepted on the first working day of 2018 and processed as long as there are funds remaining. Applications will be processed and payments made on a first come, first served basis.

To apply for City funding of your library card, complete a form and turn it in to the City Clerk at 625 S College Ave, College Place WA 99324 or lnessl@cpwa.us. You will also need to provide a document for residency verification. Acceptable documents are:

- Current WA St. Driver License / ID Card - (Showing your current College Place address)
- Current Rental Agreement - (for Applicant at College Place address)
- Current Utility Billing - (Must be for services received at residence with applicant name, such as power or gas bill, or city utility bill. Cell phone billings are not an acceptable proof of residency.)

Beginning on January 1st, 2018 your default garbage can size is changing! Rather than using smaller sizes, Basin Disposal is issuing new 96 gallon containers to households. To learn more how this transition will work for your family, read the following or call at 509-525-1711 or 509-547-2476

64 GALLON »» 96 GALLON

32 GALLON »» 96 GALLON

If you are subscribed to a 64 gallon container *PRIOR* to **January 1st, 2018** you will transition to the 96 gallon container on that date. Expect the following:

- PRIOR* to January 1st, a new container will be delivered to your home and the old 64 gallon container *REMOVED*
- BILLING* will change to reflect your new waste service level, and will be shown in your January statement.

If you are subscribed to a 32 gallon container *PRIOR* to **December 1st, 2017**, you will be “Grandfathered” and keep your container and current plan beyond that date. Grandfathered Status will continue until one of the following events requires that you upgrade.

- The *NAME* on the account changes
- The *PERSON* at the address changes
- The *ADDRESS* on the account changes to a new address or parcel
- Waste is left to the side of the container *MORE THAN 2 TIMES* (on separate days)

Classes Begin in Newly Renovated Bowers Hall Space

As we ring in the New Year in 2018, Walla Walla University is looking forward to a new beginning when classes start on Monday, Jan. 8, in the newly renovated Bowers Hall, home of the WWU School of Business.

More than 500 people attended the ribbon-cutting ceremony and grand reopening of Bowers Hall on Dec. 7 during the University's 125th anniversary celebration. The year-long renovation project added more than 3,000 square feet to the existing building and reorganized classroom and office space. The building now includes an innovation classroom/laboratory, technologies that enhance digital learning, efficient group study spaces, and multifunctional meeting spaces.

Many of our friends and neighbors worked on the project, including employees of Opp & Seibold General Contractor Inc., Walla Walla Electric, Alden Plumbing/Advanced Plumbing, Grassi Refrigeration, Modern Masonry, Narum Concrete, Conner's Flooring & Design, A-Sharpe Painting, Perfection/Yale Glass, Gillespie Roofing, Smith Brothers Landscaping, AKey Excavating, Systematic Wood Design, Colfield Framing, and Smith Insulation.

Among the most historical buildings on the WWU campus, initial construction on Bowers Hall was completed in 1924. In 1955 it was named in honor of George Bowers, chair of the chemistry department and later the 13th WWU president. Perhaps best known as the chemistry building, over the years Bowers Hall also housed the Department of History and Philosophy, an archeology laboratory, and the School of Theology. The School of Business moved into the building in '09.

"It is no haphazard choice to renovate and expand Bowers Hall," said John McVay, WWU president. "This building signals our intentions to further strengthen Walla Walla University by growing our School of Business."
